An exhibition featuring textile designer Sudo Reiko (born 1953, Ibaraki, Japan) and the activities of "NUNO," the textile design studio she leads. Sudo and NUNO's designs overflow with ideas that are not bound by conventional concepts. By using unexpected materials, for instance—or combining traditional craftsmanship with the latest industrial technology, or daring to be among the first to tackle sustainability—they continually present new perspectives on fabric as a familiar, everyday material and remain at the forefront of modern textile design.

This exhibition, originally organized and held at the museum Centre for Heritage, Arts and Textile (CHAT) in Hong Kong in 2019, will make its long-awaited opening in Japan after touring Europe during the COVID-19 pandemic. The exhibition will highlight collaborative projects with craftspeople and factories in regions of Japan, as well as efforts to expand the possibilities of materials, and will demonstrate rarely exhibited processes of textile production through immersive sound and visual installations. By giving viewers contact with fabric creation processes and enabling new understandings of textiles as products essential to everyday living, we hope the exhibition will occasion opportunities to introduce new beauty in their lives.

Sudo Reiko

Sudo Reiko, born in Ishioka, Ibaraki Prefecture in 1953. Director, NUNO Corporation. Professor Emeritus, Tokyo Zokei University.

Sudo creates innovative textiles through her command of practices and technologies ranging from traditional Japanese dyeing and weaving to contemporary high-tech textile processes. Her works are in the permanent collections of such international museums as the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) in New York; the Metropolitan Museum of Art; the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; the Los Angeles County Museum of Art; the Victoria & Albert Museum; and The National Museum of Modern Art, Tokyo. Awarded the 11th Enku Grand Prize in 2022. Books published include *Japanese textiles* 1~4 (MUJI BOOKS 2018, 2019) and *NUNO: Visionary Japanese Textiles* (Thames & Hudson 2021).

Highlights

International Traveling Exhibition, Japan Premiere

Highly acclaimed internationally, Sudo's work has frequently been featured in museums around the world. This exhibition was originally organized and held to great acclaim at the Centre for Heritage, Arts and Textile (CHAT) in Hong Kong in 2019. It thereafter traveled to Japan House London (England) and Dovecot Studios (Scotland) in 2021, and the Textilmuseum St. Gallen (Switzerland) in 2022, and now makes its Japanese premiere. The first ever large-scale solo exhibition to comprehensively survey Sudo's work.

Unveiling the secrets behind the making

A groundbreaking exhibition focused not on displaying finished textiles but showing the process behind their making. From idea sourcing to development using trial-and-error experimentation, to the actual circumstances of textile production at the factory—the entire production process normally kept secret by the artist or company will be openly revealed. The restaging of the production process, itself, will take form in beautiful immersive sound and visual installations, configured for the Museum's spaces.

Collaborative Project with Genichiro Inokuma

New installations by Sudo created collaboratively with Genichiro Inokuma's works will be exhibited exclusively at MIMOCA in its facade—the Museum's face to the world—and entrance atrium filled with natural light. Sudo's large-scale works will have a light presence in these two spaces with ceiling heights of over 14 meters.

Exhibition Composition

Spaces created by textiles

A 14-meter-wide patchwork curtain has been made from hundreds of NUNO fabric pieces. It will be displayed with a 11-meter-wide curtain of countless interlaced punchcards originally for the Jacquard loom. Visitors will enjoy experiencing the softly partitioned space the textiles create.

How an idea takes a form

An immense collection of old fabrics used as a color reference will be displayed along with materials employed in the process of producing a new textile (idea sources, sketches, raw materials, tools, documents, prototypes, etc.). Visitors will be allowed to touch the finished textiles.

Seven mini factories

The making process of seven representative Sudo textiles will be restaged in immersive, mini-factory-like sound and visual installations.

Videos displaying everyday scenes of artisans at work and machines in operation will introduce NUNO's textile factories in regions of Japan.

About MIMOCA

Marugame Genichiro-Inokuma Museum of Contemporary Art

The Marugame Genichiro-Inokuma Museum of Contemporary Art (MIMOCA) was opened November 23, 1991 as a project commemorating the 90th anniversary of the city of Marugame, Kagawa Prefecture and with the full cooperation of the artist Genichiro Inokuma, who spent his youth in and around Marugame. The beautiful station-front museum designed by architect Yoshio Taniguchi has a permanent collection introducing some 20,000 works personally donated by Inokuma and holds special exhibitions focusing primarily on contemporary art. A diverse program of lectures, concerts, and other events, including workshops to foster sensitivity and creativity among children, are part of the Museum's dedication to education.

These features of the Museum are the result of discussions held by Inokuma with the city of Marugame. It was Inokuma's fervent wish that MIMOCA be a facility for contemporary art that would actively introduce new art. The sunlight-filled and spacious spaces of the building fulfill the aspiration architect Taniguchi shared with Inokuma for beautiful spaces in an art museum. Inokuma also wanted to encourage opportunities to expose children to art, advocating free admittance to the Museum for children and proposing the establishment of the "Creative Studio" space for children.

Inokuma wanted the Museum to be a place people would visit frequently. The experience of beautiful spaces and the sight of quality works of art are the source, he believed, of the fresh and exhilarating stimuli that is healthy and energizing. He even thought of MIMOCA as a kind of "health resort for the spirit." We hope everyone will think of MIMOCA, which embodies the ideals lnokuma held dear, as that kind of "resort" for mind and spirit.
